The LEA will determine the most important educational needs by benchmarking students three times per year and to determine where gaps in programming may exist. A student survey will also be conducted for determining mental health needs of the students. Educational needs will also be determined by conducting a stakeholder survey. In order to meet all the needs of the students and staff, our technology program will need to be updated and improved. Having students remain in school is of the utmost importance. The addition of custodial staff is vital in maintaining the cleanliness of the buildings. Therefore, in person learning can continue even in the midst of the pandemic.

September, 2020 - June, 2021 - Contract outside technology support through the intermediate unit. Add additional programs to support virtual learning.April, 2021 - September, 2023 - Add additional support via school counselor at the secondary level.July, 2021 - September, 2023 - Continue contract with the intermediate unit adding additional monies for extra support.July, 2021 - June, 2023 - Add additional custodial support to maintain the cleanliness of the buildings.

ESSER II funds will be utilized for remote learning, by hiring an additional support to assist students, as well as teachers, in maneuvering through remote learning. Accessibility to remote learning will be improved through use of programs such as Papercut, Microsoft, and hot spots. In order to keep our students safe while on remote learning, JASD will implement such

programs as Go Guardian and IU 13 Mobile Security and Smoothwall programming. In order to keep teacher technology compatible with remote learning, improved docking stations and adapters were purchased for classroom use.

Please describe how the LEA intends to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services. (3000 characters max)

The Johnsonburg Area School District was able to utilize benchmarking programs such as Study Island to compare where students were academically in March of 2020 to where their academic needs were upon the beginning of the start of school in September, 2020. The JASD also purchased other benchmarking tools such as Exact Path, which made benchmarking possible for students in grades K-12. The gaps that appear in learning will be handled by interventions during the school day as well as remediation in after school programs. After school programs will be managed by classroom teachers with parent and/or teacher referrals.Student learning gaps that resulted from the disruption of loss of educational services, will be addressed with the hiring of a school counselor which is a new position. Research shows that trauma, depression, anxiety were all factors of COVID for the adolescent population. This school counselor will address these issues so that learning can get back on track. This person will address individual students and well as groups of students in helping them deal with areas of difficulty in their lives.

Areas of emphasis should include:

- Documenting learning loss associated with extended school closure;

Surveys and benchmarking will be used to determine learning loss and social/emotional well being of students. Appropriate interventions will be conducted on an as needed basis. The educational plan as developed in the fall of 2021 will be reevaluated by the board of education no less than every six months. Vulnerable student populations and family support will be conducted by the additional school counselor and/or outside service providers.
